

FINDING IDEAS FOR WRITING


Listening and speaking helps us explore, share and develop our ideas We are all authors and have a story to tell














GATHER MATERIALS

- Your Writer's Notebook (see Oct.5-9)
- Writing and drawing tools: pencil, pen, pencil crayons, or any other tool that you might want to try.

VIEW, THINK AND WRITE

- Read along with <u>The Idea Jar</u>. Ideas can come from anywhere. Think about ideas that you might want to use for a future story.
- Make a list of possible characters or possible settings you might write about and record it in your Writer's Notebook. You can draw it too!
- Listen to author Marie Louise Gay as she shares where her stories come from in her book Any Questions?
- Make a list of possible questions or wonderings you have and write those in your notebook.
