
POETREE AND POETRY

Using language in creative and playful ways helps us understand how language works.

WRITE AND DRAW EVERYDAY!

Remember to use your Writer's Notebook daily to record:

- ideas for POEMS, stories or non-fiction
- drawings and descriptions of characters or topics
- words you've collected that you find interesting
- beginning or endings you like
- wonderings...do you have a question for the author?

GATHER MATERIALS

- Your Writerr's Notebook or piece of paper
- A pencil or any other writing tool

READ, THINK, WRITE

- Read along with **Poetree**
- Think about the word choices the author has made. In your Writer's Notebook write down one of your favourite poems in the book. What did you like about the words or phrases of the poem you chose?
- Notice how many syllables are in each line of the Ninja Star poem:

I've wondered a while (5)

Can a tree and child be friends (7)

Your words give me hope (5)

- This 3-line poem is called a Haiku.
- Create your own Haiku poem about your favourite season or write one for a tree "friend" in your neighbourhood! Remember to use descriptive words that paint a picture in the readers mind.

GO BEYOND

Read along with other books about our Tree friends. How might you be a friend to trees? How might you learn their names?
