# Protagonist vs. Antagonist

Most good fiction stories will have 2 important characters. A Protagonist and an antagonist.

Protagonist	Antagonist
<p>The protagonist is the main character in the story. They are usually the hero at the end of the story.</p>	<p>The antagonist is the bad/evil character in the story. They are usually in conflict with the protagonist.</p>

# Types of Characters

In a story, there are many types of characters that an author will add. Some impact the plot more than others.

Dynamic  
Characters

We usually know a lot about **round** and **dynamic characters**. They are often the main characters and they go through change in the story.



Flat

&



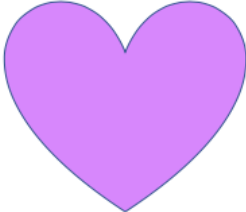



Static  
Characters

Flat and **static characters** don't experience much change and the readers know very little about them. They do not impact the plot very much.

# Finding Character Traits

Sometimes the author will say the traits of a character, but sometimes the reader will have to infer what a character's traits are through **actions, dialogue, feelings, and thoughts.**

<p style="text-align: center;"><b>Actions</b></p> <div style="text-align: center;"></div> <p>What does the character do? Do they follow rules? How do they treat other characters? What can you infer from the character's action?</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b>Dialogue</b></p> <div style="text-align: center;"></div> <p>What are the words the character is saying? Do they talk the same to all the other characters? What do the words reveal about their personality?</p>
<p style="text-align: center;"><b>Feelings</b></p> <div style="text-align: center;"></div> <p>How does the character feel about the events and other characters in the story? Why do you think the character feels that way? Do the feelings change?</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b>Thoughts</b></p> <div style="text-align: center;"></div> <p>What types of things does the character think about? What does the character say to themselves?</p>
