
# HUNTING FOR RHYMES! PREDICTING RHYMING WORDS IN BOOKS


Using language in creative and playful ways helps us understand how language works.


Language and story can be a source of creativity and joy.

# LISTEN, MOVE, SING AND READ ALONG

## **CREATE AND SHARE**

- Inspired by the rhyming read alouds, create another page for one or two of the books. Draw and write your idea. For example:
- If you use A Hunting We Will Go, draw the animal (or thing) you catch on half the page and where you'll put your animal on the other half of the page. Like this:



In Down By the Bay, draw the animal (or thing) that you see and write, "Did you ever see a \_\_\_\_\_ with \_\_\_\_. Or "Did you ever see a \_\_\_\_\_ wearing a \_\_\_\_." Or you can create your own rhyming picture and sentence.

#### GO BEYOND

 Listen to author Michael Rosen as he dramatically reads his story We Are Going On A Bear Hunt. Watch it more than once and see if you can follow along with him using the same sounds and actions. Ask someone in your family to join you!
