

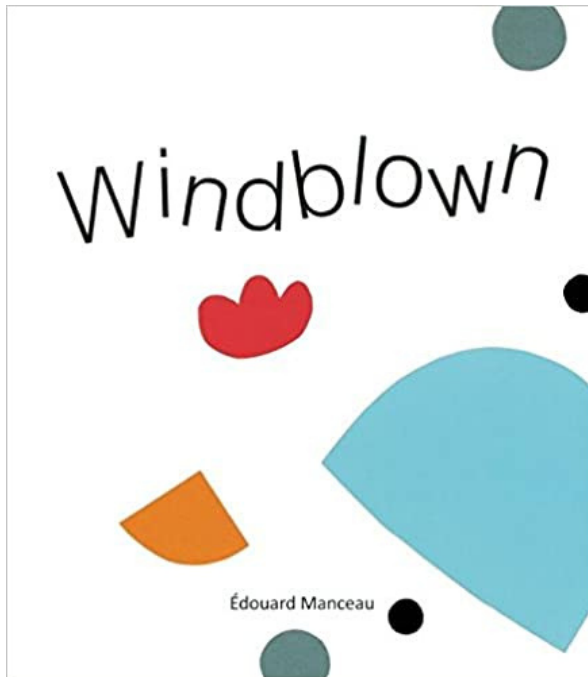
WINDBLOWN

MAKING STORIES WITH PAPER

GATHER MATERIALS

- Different coloured papers
- Scissors
- Glue (optional)
- Drawing tools

LISTEN AND IMAGINE

Follow along with Édouard Manceau's story, Windblown. Where did all the pieces of paper come from? Who do they belong to? Imagine what other shapes the wind might blow your way.

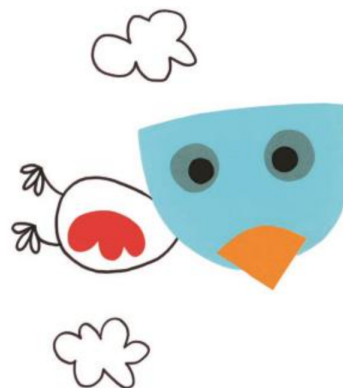
CREATE AND SHARE

Inspired by Manceau's story, create your own animals or creatures using cut paper shapes.

- Cut or tear shapes of various colours (similar to *Windblown* or design your own shapes).
- Create your animal or creature using your shapes.
- Without using glue, use your shapes over and over again to try a variety of ways to create your animal.
- If you choose to glue your shapes on paper you may want to also use drawing tools to add details.
- Write, "Who do these shapes belong to?" "They are mine, said the ____" (your animal).
