

We are all authors and have a story to tell




GATHER MATERIALS


- Paper any size, any colour or use one of your pre made books that you made last term

READ ALONG & THINK

- Notice how each author organizes their book. Nikki
 McClure uses detailed illustrations and one descriptive
 word. Jean Reagan uses titles and lists. Other authors use
 step by step instructions. For example, "First..., then..., and
 finally..."Think about how you might write your "How-to"
 book.





GO BEYOND

CREATE another "How to..." book about your favourite topic or about something you know well. You might write about making a favourite snack like "How to make a peanut butter and jam sandwich" or about how to play a game.

CREATE & SHARE

- MAKE your own "How To..." book.
 Choose your own topic or create your
 own similar to these. It's really important
 to remember yourself doing something
 and picture it, almost like you're
 watching a video in slow motion, pausing
 often to say, "What exact words
 describe what I just did?"
- DRAW and WRITE what is most important for the reader to know. You may even want to label your pictures to help your reader learn more.
- READ your book to someone. Ask them if they could understand and follow your instructions. If not, how might you change some of your drawings or words?
