Glossary

A glossary lists new or important words in alphabetical order and tells you what they mean. These words are often in **bold** throughout the book. Use the glossary below to answer the following questions..

GLOSSARY

endow (en-DOW)—To provide with a permanent fund or source of income.

exile (EK-zyl)—To be forbidden to live in or even visit one's native land.

haven (HAY-vun)—A place of shelter and safety.

Hindu (HIN-doo)—A person, especially of northern India, whose religion includes the belief in being reborn on earth and the idea of escaping earthly evils.

Internally Displaced Person (IDP)—Someone who is forced to flee his or her home but who remains within his or her country's borders.

Islam—The religious faith of Muslims.

Koran (kor-AN)—The sacred text of Islam accepted as the foundation of Islamic law, religion, culture, and politics.

laureate (LAW-ree-ut)—A person who has been given a great award.

martyr (MAR-tur)—Person who is put to death or endures great suffering on behalf of a belief, principle, or cause.

Muslim (MOOS-lim or MUZ-lim)—The religion, law, or civilization of Islam; also, a person whose religion is Islam.

Nobel (noh-BEL) Peace Prize—One of five prizes created by inventor Alfred Nobel, along with prizes in Chemistry, Physics, Physiology, and Literature, to honor those who have made the greatest contributions to mankind in their field.

omen (OH-men)—Anything believed to foretell a good or evil event.

prime minister—The chief of government.

Taliban (TAL-ih-ban)—An extremist Muslim group in Afghanistan that often uses violence to achieve its goals.

terrorist (TAYR-or-ist)—A person who frightens others in order to gain power.

United Nations—The international organization committed to maintaining international peace and security. Starting with 51 countries in 1945, its membership now includes 193 governments

Urdu (UR-doo)—One of the official languages of Pakistan.
